### What “Good Turn” has your unit completed?

**Eagle Scout Projects:** Information compiled during Eagle pre-reviews for the previous month.

- Crew 150 built a footbridge over a ravine, with three youth and four adults, putting in a total of 81 volunteer hours.
- Team 130 built a frame for the Native American Lodge at Sacajawea State Park, with five youth and three adults, putting in a total of 112 volunteer hours.
- Troop 249 re-landscaped 2 flower beds at Columbia Point Marina Park, with five youth and five adults, putting in a total of 123 volunteer hours.
- Crew 152 cleared a campsite at Teacum Timers LDS Camp, with eight youth and three adults, putting in a total of 67 volunteer hours.
- Troop 305 built three bird shelters for the City of Walla Walla’s Pioneer Park, with 20 youth and three adults, putting in a total of 72 volunteer hours.
- Troop 305 built a “Varsity Ranking Board” for the wrestling team at Walla Walla High School, with three youth and six adults, putting in a total of 71 volunteer hours.
- Troop 148 constructed benches for the Kennewick First Presbyterian Church courtyard, with five youth and two adults, putting in a total of 62 volunteer hours.
- Troop 898 built a picnic shelter at Seneca City Park, with 12 youth and four adults, putting in a total of 253 volunteer hours.
- Crew 170 cleared a path and pond area at Bingham Canyon Pioneer Camp, with 11 youth and 11 adults, putting in a total of 174 volunteer hours.
- Crew 170 installed an irrigation system at Bingham Canyon Pioneer Campgrounds, with seven youth and five adults, putting in a total of 85 volunteer hours.
- Crew 192 landscaped a flagpole area at Robert Olds Jr. High School in Connell, with six youth and two adults, putting in a total of 71 volunteer hours.
